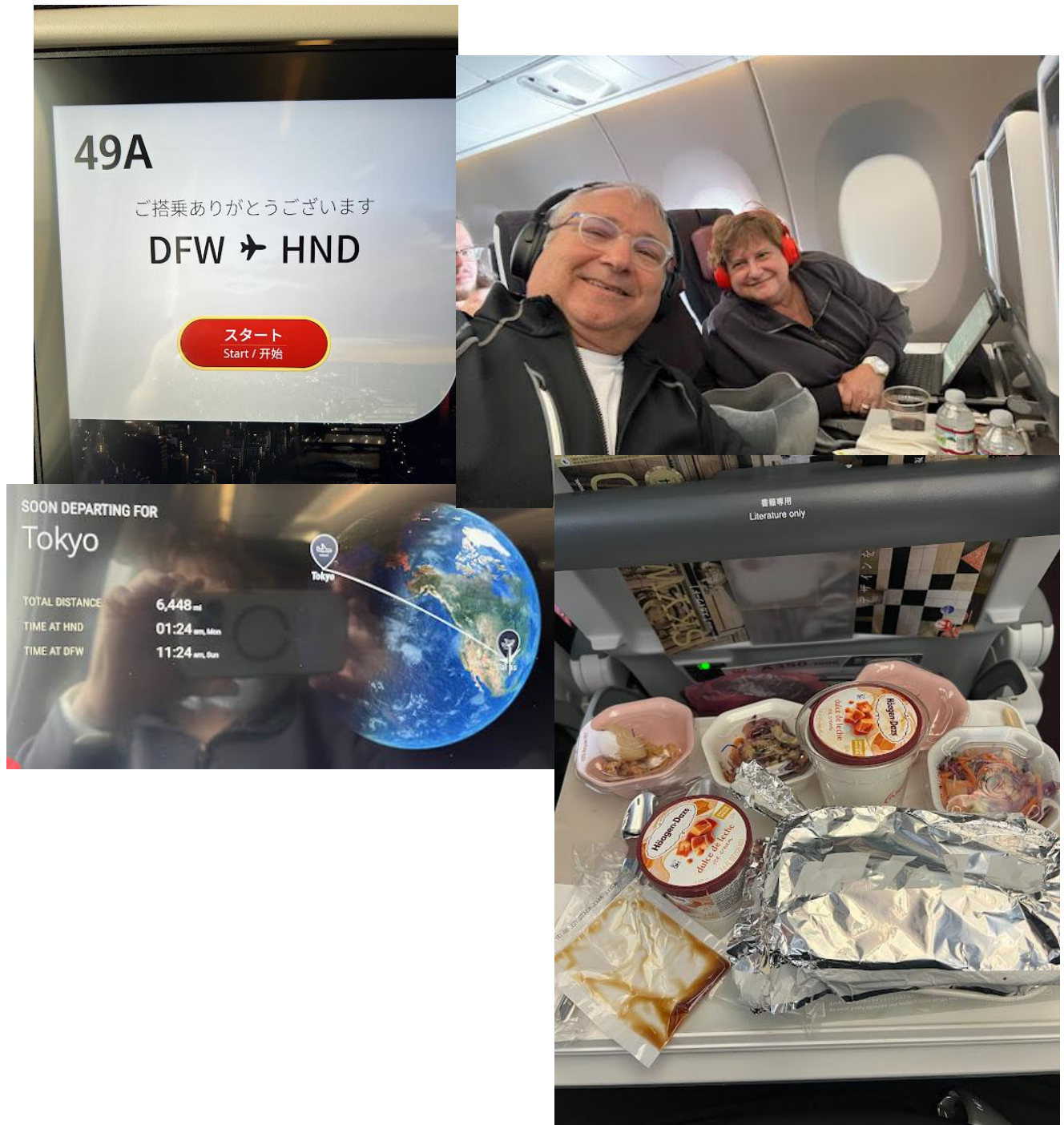

## Sunday April 6, 2025 -- Board Japan Airline Flight to Tokyo

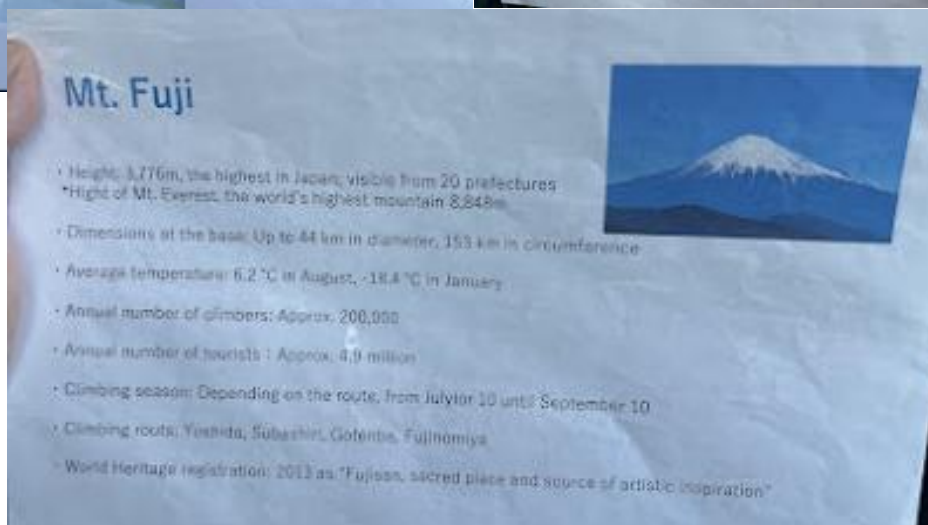
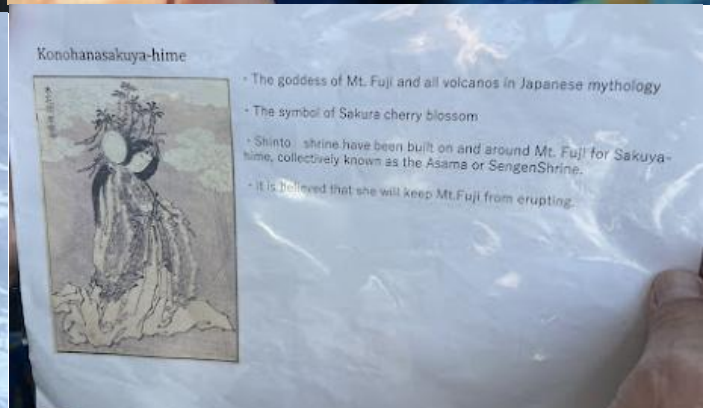
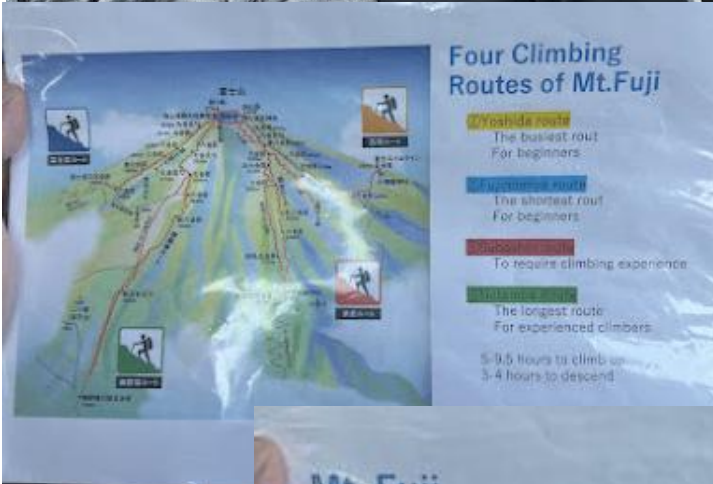

## Wednesday April 9 – Mt Fuji

Had Breakfast at Oceanview Cafe. Our Mt Fuji Excursion left at 7:45 am for Hongu Sengen Taisha Shrine and Mt. Fuji World Heritage Center. Our day was a very rare, clear blue-sky day. A visit just two days before we arrived, visitors could not see the mountain because it was covered in clouds. Our tour bus guide gave us her cell phone in case we had gotten lost. The Shinto goddess of Mt. Fuji is known as Sengen or Konohana. She is also the Goddess of Volcanoes and cherry blossoms and resides within Mt Fuji. It is believed she will keep Mt. Fuji from erupting, and she is represented by the Sakura Flower. There are four major routes to the summit of Mt. Fuji. It takes about 4 to 6 hours to climb to summit and 2-3 hours to climb down.



Mt Fuji is a symbol of Japan and a popular destination for hikers. We were not there long enough to climb. Japanese society considers Mt. Fuji a sacred mountain with great spiritual and cultural significance. Mount Fuji is a 12,389 feet tall volcano cone and its last major eruption was in 1707. The catastrophic ash outfall is considered a Badge of Honor to Japanese. It is covered in snow for about five months of the year. A bottle of water costs 100 yen at ground level, 200 yen at 5<sup>th</sup> station, and 500 yen at summit. First glimpses of Mt. Fuji on bus ride up.



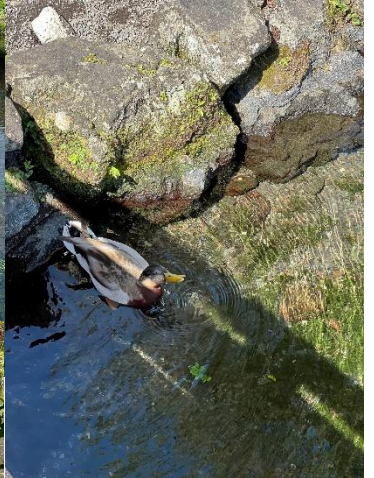


Both Shinto Shrines (about 100,000) and Buddhist Temples (about 77,000) are common throughout Japan. Originally built over 1,000 years ago for protection from volcanic eruptions, the Hongu Sengen Taisha is the oldest and the head Shinto Shrine. It stands at the southwestern base of Mt. Fuji. Earthquakes devastated much of the Shrine over the years. The structures that remain were built in the 1600s by Shogun Tokugawa. The Torii gates mark the boundary between the sacred and the secular world. The ground is home to about 500 cherry trees which usually bloom from late March to early April.





The Wakutamaike Spring Pond is renowned for its crystal clear water that gushes from subterranean sources under Mt. Fuji. The pristine springs are home to various bird species, including Mallard Ducks. Historically, the water was used by pilgrims and climbers of Mt. Fuji for purification rituals before embarking on their climbs.

Name Wakutama Pond

This pond is formed when melting snow from the sacred Mount Fuji springs up from between the lava rocks. The water temperature is 13 degrees Celsius, and the amount of water that springs up is two to four kiloliters per second, with the amount remaining almost constant throughout the year.

Since ancient times, it has been the custom for pilgrims on the Fuji mountain to purify themselves in this pond and chant "purify the six senses" as they ascend the mountain.

Japan is famous for its extensive network of Vending Machines, with one of the highest densities in the world. There are over 5.5 million vending machines in the country, meaning one for every 23 people. You can find vending machines dispensing a wide variety of items, including snacks, noodles, rice and even unique items like engagement rings. Worshippers write prayers on paper and leave them hanging up in front of the shrine. They believe Kami (spirits or gods) are to receive them. We had soft serve ice cream. Lonny had matcha and I had vanilla.





Mt. Fuji World Heritage Center opened in 2017 and is a UNESCO World Heritage Site. The Center's top floor has a viewing observation deck with spectacular views of Mt. Fuji. There are a variety of exhibitions of Mt. Fuji Volcano's seismology, history and cultural significance. The building has an inverted conical form that reflects in the pond outside to reveal the shape of the iconic mountain. The upside-down wood project uses roughly 8,000 pieces of Fuji Cypress timber. Inside, visitors walk through a 200-meter-long sloped walkway that corkscrews up and around the floors of the building. There is also a movie theater showing footage of the mountain in different seasons.



#### Ascending Fuji

Aiming for the summit of Mount Fuji has its roots in a traditional style of 'worship-ascent', a custom which has been passed down from generation to generation. In this zone, you can experience climbing Mt. Fuji from the ocean—something which is only possible in Shizuoka Prefecture—by ascending a 193m-long spiral ramp while watching time-lapse videos of the landscape of Fuji.

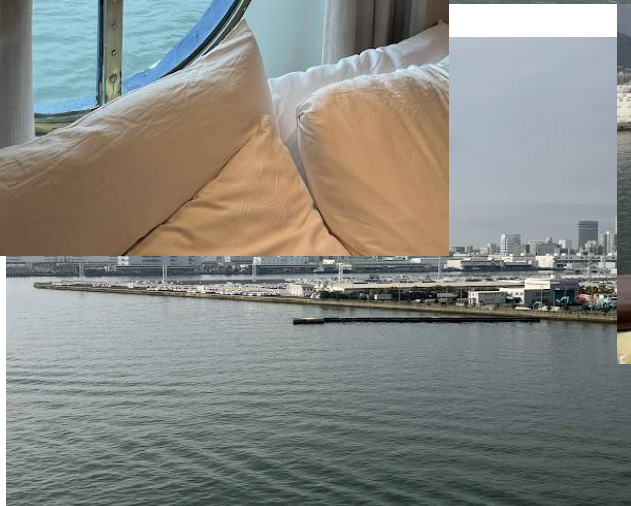
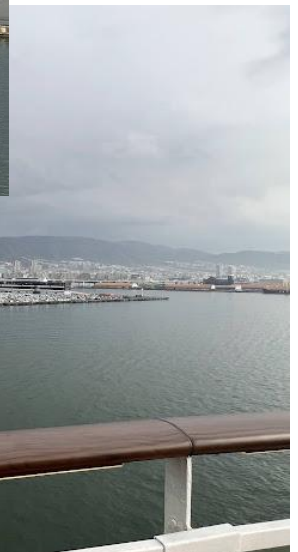


## **Friday, April 11, 2025 – Kobe, Japan**

Our Excursion in Kobe left at 8:40 am to visit Himeji Castle and Garden. With a population of around 1.5 million, Kobe is Japan's seventh-largest city and third-largest port city after Tokyo and Yokohama. We stopped at an interesting bathroom along the way.

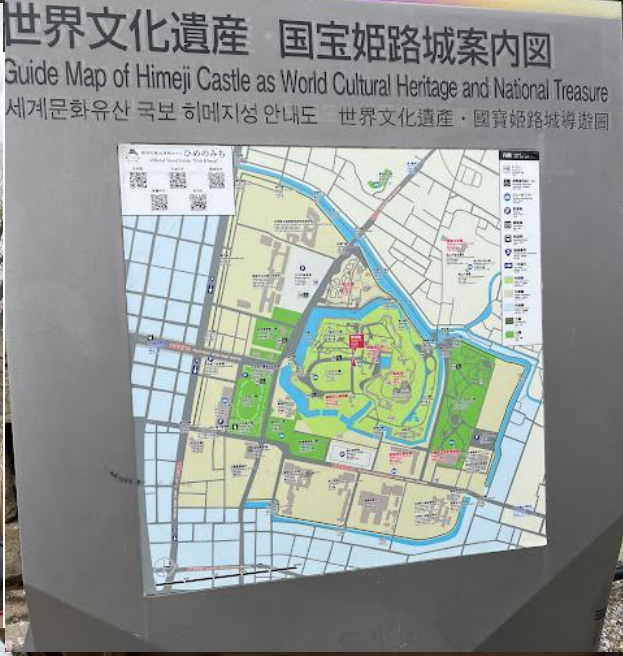




Himeji Castle, also known as White Heron Castle, due to its elegant, white appearance and resemblance to a bird taking flight. It is Japan's most spectacular and largest castle for its imposing size and beauty and its well preserved, complex castle grounds. Unlike many other Japanese castles, it was never destroyed by war, earthquake or fire and survives to this day as one of the country's twelve original castles. During World War II, although most of the surrounding area was burned to the ground, the castle survived intact. The first construction began in the 1400s and was gradually enlarged over the centuries by the various clans who ruled over the region. The castle complex as it survives today was completed in 1609 as the best-preserved feudal castle.









There are over 1,000 Cherry Blossom trees, many ancient aged, on the grounds of Himeji Castle. The castle's grounds are transformed into a stunning display, creating a beautiful contrast with the white castle walls. Typically, the Peak Cherry Blossom Season is from late March to Early April, offering a short but vibrant window to experience the full bloom. Most fortunately, we were visiting during the peak Cherry Blossom Season.



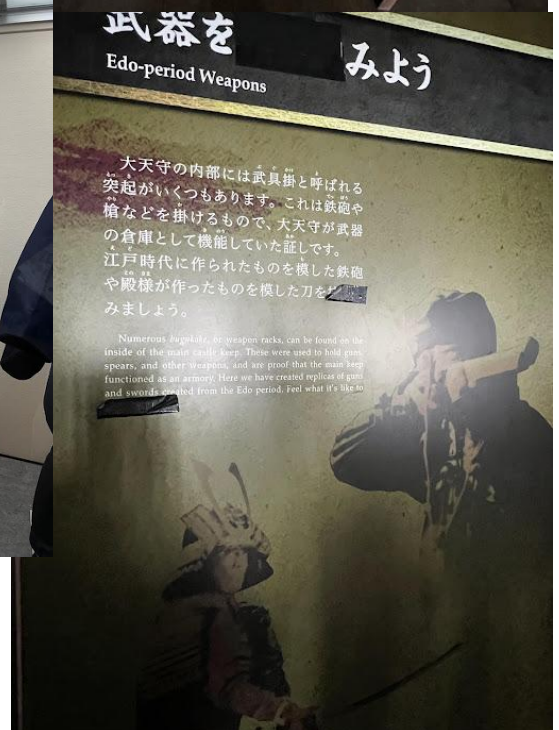
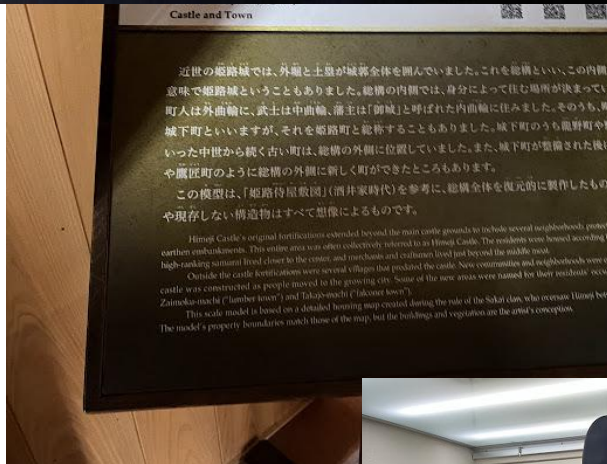


Himeji Castle is made up of over eighty buildings connected by a series of gates and confusing, winding paths like a labyrinth. The purpose was to slow down and expose attacking forces. In many cases the castle walkways even turn back on themselves, greatly inhibiting navigation. At the heart of the complex is the main keep, a six-story wooden structure, Japan's most visited castle with over 2.8 million visitors per year. The Castle has been featured extensively in films and TV series including, James Bond's "You Only Live Twice" and TV miniseries, "Shogun". There are also many legends and folklore stories associated with the Castle. Before entering Himeji Castle, as a common custom of Japan, we were required to remove our shoes on the first floor.

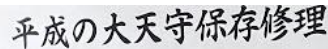
### Under the Skin: Himeji Castle's Frame

この模型は、昭和の土木修理工事の際に大天守の腐座修理のための実物の1/20で製作されました。

昭和の大修理工事は史上初めての組全体修理だったので、歴史的建造物のもつ技術的特徴、あるいは構造上の欠陥や部品の処理、そして全体的な方法として組みとら直しと施工上で施工しなくてはなりません。さらに、建物を永く維持できるように、換気・腐食部分の取り替えと各部材の補強方法の検討も不可欠でした。さまざまな問題を明らかにし、安全で効率的な工事を行うための検討用に製作された模型です。

This is a 1:20 scale model of the timber frame of Himeji Castle's main keep. The keep is supported by a lattice of posts and beams rather than by thick outer walls, with the two columns at the center of the structure bearing the heaviest load.

The model was built as a guide for the workers who carried out a major renovation of the castle between 1956 and 1964, when the entire keep was dismantled, repaired, and reassembled. This project required a precise understanding of every aspect of Himeji's historical architecture, beginning with the methods used in the castle's original construction. Damaged parts of the castle's structure were replaced or reinforced to preserve the building for future generations.

### Reversing Half a Century of Wear and Tear

姫路城大守は昭和39年(1964)に完了した昭和の大修理から半世紀が過ぎ、昭和46年の戦後最大の修理が行われていました。そのため平成21年(2010)から約6年計画で大規模な保存修理工事を開始しました。修理期間中は衆議館内に見学エリアを設けることで、文化財の修理への関心や理解を深めるだけでなく取り組みました。

「平城の保存修理」は大守の没の姿直しと壁の補修を中心とした本務工事です。外壁や根柢目地部などこの影響の少ない部分を中心とする工事は、およそ50年に一度の修理と位置づけられています。

Since the release of the *Shower* in 1966, rain, wind, and snow have taken their toll on the work. Even the highest wind glass levels need to be replaced every 30 years, and a scale restoration of the hoop was carried out here 2003 to 2015. Though the hoop was not dismantled as it had been during prior restoration projects, the *Shower* was still a major undertaking. Over the course of more than five years, workers replaced lead flat, patched walls, and reinforced the structure to protect it against subsidence. Visitors were given access to the metal scaffolding that covered the hoop so they could watch the work in progress.
